

Take the child and his mother! (Mt 2,13)

Saint Joseph and Father Kentenich

Pope Francis has proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph," which will continue until December 8, 2021. The reason for this is the fact that 150 years ago Saint Joseph was declared patron saint of the Church.



Father Kentenich was attached to Saint Joseph in a special way throughout his life. This resulted from the very fact that this saint was his patron saint. As a priest and founder, he often gave sermons or talks on this day and contemplated various aspects of the life of Jesus' silence, foster father: his his listening to his God's word. unconditional obedience, but above all also the central task that was

repeatedly entrusted to him in his dreams: "Take the Child and his Mother!"

In these words, Father Kentenich saw in a certain way his own task in life and the mission of Schoenstatt, his foundation, in a nutshell: never to separate the Child and his Mother from each other, to accept them as a great treasure in one's life and then to bring them close to the people. To proclaim the inner unity of Christ and Mary everywhere was one of his central concerns.

In a talk given on March 19, 1966, he gives testimony to this in the following way: "Joseph, get up! Take the Child and his Mother!"

First of all, he obviously has the task, the mission, to make sure that the Child and his Mother reign in his own heart in indissoluble two-in-oneness. "Take the child and his Mother."

What should we emphasize in today's meaning, in terms of currents of today's Church ...? "Take the Child and his Mother!" The two-in-oneness!

Plea for us: We too should, if we share his mission – and we do that in a special way under this view point – make sure that the two-in-oneness exists in indissoluble two-in oneness between the Savior and the

Mother of God, that both persons rule our heart, our whole life.

"Joseph, get up, take the Child and his Mother!" Thus, carry him out, bring him to the nations!

This is a great task, which we must never forget in today's confused and confusing times ... Let us take Jesus and Mary in holy two-in-oneness wherever we have a task.

Once again, we say that this two-inoneness is not to the disadvantage of Christ, but to the advantage, to the most necessary advantage! ...

We suffer from the fact that we know all kinds of things, but love and live too little. We may study, fill our minds with facts of science, but what will help us to receive Christ, Christ alive in us, to take life-giving Christ in as а personality? ... The way through the Blessed Mother - Our Lady gives us a vitalis Christi cognitio (living knowledge of Christ). What does that mean? A living knowledge, a knowledge linked with love. а loving, embracing knowledge; а living – *vitalis* – therefore also a life -giving one. If Christ is to fulfill his mission as redeemer of the world, we must never separate him from

his blessed Mother."

What Father Kentenich stated here is also confirmed by Pope Francis in his letter for the Year of



Joseph. The Holy Father calls Jesus and Mary the most precious treasure of our faith. He invites us that we, like

Joseph, guard this treasure with all our strength. We are to learn "care and responsibility from Joseph: to love the Child and his Mother; to love the sacraments and fraternal charity; to love the Church and the poor. Each of these realities is always the Child and his Mother."

Patris corde - with a fatherly heart

Read here a few excerpts from the Letter of Pope Francis on the occasion of the Year of Saint Joseph.

Undoubtedly, the aspects of his fatherhood, as drawn here, were also decisive for the way Father Kentenich understood and lived his priestly fatherhood.

Father in obedience

As God revealed his plan of salvation to Mary, he also revealed it to Joseph. God did this through dreams which in the Bible, as among all the ancient peoples, were regarded as one of the ways through which God makes known his will.

In every situation of life, Joseph was able to express his *fiat* (let it be done to me), as Mary did at the Annunciation and Jesus did in Gethsemane.

Father in acceptance

Often things happen in our lives whose meaning we do not understand. Our first reaction is often one of disappointment and resistance. Joseph leaves his reflections aside to give space to what is happening. However mysterious it may seem to him, he accepts it, takes responsibility for it, and reconciles it with his own history. If we do not reconcile with our history. we will not be able to take the next step, because we will always then remain hostage to our expectations and the resulting disappointments.

Joseph is not a passively resigned man. He is a courageous and strong protagonist. The ability to accept something is one way in which the gift of fortitude that comes from the Holy Spirit is manifested in our lives. Only the Lord can give us the strength to accept life as it is, and to give room even to what is contradictory, unexpected, or disappointing in it.

Father with creative courage

The Gospel tells us that God always succeeds in saving what matters, provided that we have the same creative courage as the carpenter of Nazareth. He knows how to turn a problem into an opportunity by always trusting first and foremost in Providence.

If God sometimes does not seem to help us it does not mean that he has abandoned us, but that he trusts us and in what we can plan, develop, and find.

The Gospel does not give any information about the time when Mary and Joseph and the Child were in Egypt. Certainly, however they had to eat, find a place to stay and work. It does not take much imagination to fill the silence of the Gospel in this regard. The Holy Family had to face concrete problems, like all other families, like many of our brothers and sisters who, even today as migrants, are still forced to risk their lives. At the end of all the scenes in which Joseph plays an important role, the Gospel notes, that he gets up, takes the Child and his Mother and does what God has commanded him to do (cf. Mt 1:24; 2:14.21). In fact, Jesus and Mary, his mother, are the most precious treasure of our faith.

Father in the shadow

In his book *The Shadow of the Father*, the Polish writer Jan Dobraczyński narrates in novel form the life of Saint Joseph. With the impressive image of the shadow, he outlines the figure of Joseph, who, in relation to Jesus, is the earthly shadow of the heavenly Father. He guards and protects him, does not forsake him, and follows his steps.

Every time someone takes responsibility for the life of another, he is exercising, in a certain sense, fatherhood.

In all circumstances, we must always be mindful of the exercise of fatherhood, we must always see that it is never possessive, but rather points symbolically to a higher fatherhood. In a sense, we are all always in Joseph's position: we are "shadows" of the one Father in heaven, who makes his sun rise on the bad and the good and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust (cf. Mt 5:45); and we are "shadows" in following the Son.




PROFESSIONAL



was born on November 16, 1885, in Gymnich near Cologne and died on September 15, 1968, in the Trinity Church of Berg Schoenstatt, immediately after the celebration of the Holy Mass. He is also buried in this church. His sarcophagus bears the inscription **Dilexit ecclesiam - He loved the church**.
